Hebrews 10

¹⁹ Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, ²⁰ by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh, ²¹ and since we have a great priest over the house of God, ²² let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. ²³ Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. ²⁴ And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, ²⁵ not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near.

If I say, "Surely the darkness shall cover me, and the light about me be night," even the darkness is not dark to you; the night is bright as the day, for darkness is as light with you. Psalm 139:11-12

Psalm 42

¹As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God.

²My soul thirsts for God, for the living God.

When shall I come and appear before God?

³ My tears have been my food day and night, while they say to me all the day long,

"Where is your God?"

⁴These things I remember,

as I pour out my soul:

how I would go with the throng and lead them in procession to the house of God with glad shouts and songs of praise,

a multitude keeping festival.

 Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you in turmoil within me?
Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my salvation ⁶ and my God. (lit: "for the salvation of his face")

My soul is cast down within me; therefore I remember you from the land of Jordan and of Hermon, from Mount Mizar.

⁷Deep calls to deep at the roar of your waterfalls; all your breakers and your waves have gone over me. ⁸ By day the LORD commands his steadfast love, and at night his song is with me, a prayer to the God of my life. ⁹I say to God, my rock: "Why have you forgotten me? Why do I go mourning because of the oppression of the enemy?" ¹⁰ As with a deadly wound in my bones, my adversaries taunt me, while they say to me all the day long, "Where is your God?" "Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you in turmoil within me? Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my salvation and my God. (lit: "the one who is salvation of my face")

If our emotions and circumstances do not change when we have sought the Lord through the Bible and prayer, we can be tempted to conclude that doing so doesn't work, that theology really won't fix our problems, that we need something else, perhaps something more practical. Those conclusions fail to see that the quick fix of the change of circumstance or emotions may not be what God has for us. He may mean to bless us through the long night of yearning, even if that long night lasts years. The question confronting us is whether the one for whom long is worth the wait.
