Exodus 3

¹³Then Moses said to God, "If I come to the people of Israel and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" ¹⁴God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM." And he said, "Say this to the people of Israel: 'I AM has sent me to you.'"

The God of the Bible is not merely the biggest, strongest spiritual being of all. He is not merely a being among other beings. He is the Creator of all that exists. There are only two categories of existing things: God in one category by himself and, in the other category, all that is not God, including angels, demons, human beings, and the entire spiritual and material realms of creation...Everything in that second category has its existence as a gift from the One who created all that exists and is himself uncreated.

...All other beings have existence in addition to their essence. But God's being [essence] *is* his existence...For God to name himself "I Am" is tantamount to him saying, "I am my own existence. Nothing gave me my existence and I did not bring myself into existence. I could never fail to exist or cease to exist, because I am."

Psalm 66 To the choirmaster. A Song. A Psalm. ¹Shout for joy to God, all the earth; ² sing the glory of his name; give to him glorious praise! ³Say to God, "How awesome are your deeds! So great is your power that your enemies come cringing to you. ⁴All the earth worships you and sings praises to you; God who has a name they sing praises to your name." (Selah)

God who preserves a people ¹³ I will come into your house with burnt offerings; I will perform my vows to you, ¹⁴ that which my lips uttered and my mouth promised when I was in trouble. ¹⁵ I will offer to you burnt offerings of fattened animals, with the smoke of the sacrifice of rams; I will make an offering of bulls and goats. (Selah) God who preserves me (in spite of myself) ¹⁶Come and hear, all you who fear God, and I will tell what he has done for my soul. ¹⁷ I cried to him with my mouth, and high praise was on my tongue. ¹⁸ If I had cherished iniquity in my heart,

the Lord would not have listened. ¹⁹ But truly God has listened; he has attended to the voice of my prayer.
